Worship with Us

Worship As We Begin a New Year

A new year, you ask? That doesn't begin until January, don't rush things Pastor. It is true that on your calendar January 1st is the beginning of the year. The church, however, operates on a different set of seasons and dates. A new year begins for us with Advent, with December 3rd being the first Sunday of Advent. So we change our paraments to blue, a color of hope. This year we begin reading our gospel lessons from the book of Mark. Advent is a time to prepare for the major holy season of Christmas, when God sent His own Son to bring us an up close and personal understanding of who God is. It is through Jesus that we see how His will is to play out in human life, and what that plan of salvation entails. As always we add the Advent wreath to our worship setting so we keep track of our progress toward Christmas; as we watch for the Messiah. It is during Advent that we begin to understand the real reason for the season which is coming.

The gospel readings during these weeks remind us that no one knows the day or hour of the coming of the Lord. John the Baptist came to announce his first coming so that the people would get prepared but even with that proclamation not everyone wanted to listen. In the return of the Messiah, the event will be an even greater surprise but we need not fear, for we have the means for being ready, if we remain alert. So our worship will focus on these things for the first three weeks in December.

The 4th Sunday of Advent is on the 24th. Our 9 AM service will be led by our youth as they help us consider the *Sound of the Bells*. They will help us consider how the sound of various bells tells the story of God's glory and the humble arrival of the babe of Bethlehem. It is a story that bears repeating again and again. We will be anticipating that birth, as Mary did so many years ago.

At 7 PM on that day we will celebrate Christmas Eve with candlelight worship. We join together to hear that well-known story told by angels and shared by the shepherds. We will sing that especially loved carol of 'Silent Night' with our burning candles held high. Come and be with us.

On the 30th and the 31st we will complete our Christmas season as we recall Jesus' presentation at the temple and Simeon's faith.

November 5 ~ All Saints Sunday



With rejoicing and a celebratory march our CLAC students ushered in All Saints Sunday. Sticks clacking and everyone singing "Oh, When the Saints Go Marching In", we got into an upbeat mood. Their T-shirts read "Love and Blessed" and we learned the truth that our Lord does indeed love us so much that he names us 'saints' as we clothe ourselves with Christ. Then we are blessed by God's attendant honor which is lavished upon His children.

This service gave time for remembering those individuals who were taken from us this past year and in years past. We give thanks that while they were with us the Light of Christ shined in them so we could see the way we need to walk. Our cross became filled with candles burning.



 - 3 yards of 44" wide fabric
 - 4 yards of 36" wide fabric

November 10, 2023 - Caritas Annual Donation Plea

2023 has been a record-breaking year so far. The Caritas mission began in 2013; we have never experienced this level of need.

Housing and Homelessness continue to be the top issue for our clients. Caritas has done what we can, late rent to avoid evictions paving homelessness, paving campground fees, and providing short-term hotel stays when possible. We have spent \$48,522 (Jan-Sept) on housing and emergency stays for the homeless. Many people are forced to live in campgrounds, their vehicles or in situations that are unhealthy, unsavory, or even dangerous. Now that campgrounds are closed the only option is to live in a vehicle or out in the elements.


Assistance with energy needs (gas, electric, propane) is another way we've been able to help. Our volunteers have become extremely proficient at advocating for clients with energy companies to avoid shutoffs, forgive late fees and to negotiate reasonable payment plans.

FROM THE ASSISTANT TO THE BISHOP **PASTOR JIM DUEHRING**

"Got Hope?"

Several years ago, a very wise and competent person said to me, "Hope is not a strategy."

The context was not about church matters, but about a significant project involving lots of money and many, many action steps. Barriers to the goal were multitude, yet the vision of the project remained. The key people on the project were not wanting or willing to give up.

I think really what he meant to say was that "wishful thinking" or "magical thinking" is not a strategy to help us move forward to achieve the outcome we want.

The Bible says a lot about HOPE.

Probably the most famous passage about HOPE is from Jeremiah 29:11:

"For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." (NRSV)

Romans 8:25 is helpful:

"But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience." (NRSV)

Pastor Eugene Peterson, author of The Message version of the Bible, wrote the following in his book, A Long Obedience in the Same Direction: Discipleship in an Instant Society:

Hope defined Hoping does not mean doing nothing.... It means going about our assigned tasks, confident that God will provide the meaning and the conclusions. It is not compelled to work away at keeping up appearances with a bogus spirituality. It is the opposite of desperate and panicky manipulations, of scurrying and worrying. And hoping is not dreaming. It is not spinning an illusion or fantasy to protect us from our boredom or our pain. It means a confident, alert expectation that God will do what he said he will do. It is imagination put in the harness of faith. It is a willingness to let God do it his way and in his time. It is the opposite of making plans that we demand that God put into effect, telling him both how and when to do it.

I really like what Peterson says about hope. There's a lot of solid wisdom and perspective contained in those words above.

I'm glad we have many churches with HOPE in their name. Here in Marquette, we have Marquette Hope—a shared ministry of four Methodist ministries. I've never run across a church named. "No Hope Here".

There are a lot of things and institutions that we have lost hope in. Most people have no hope that Congress can run efficiently. I still don't want to give up hope in that matter because we need good leadership and decision making in Congress. I will try to stay informed. I will vote. Most importantly, I will pray for our nation's leaders no matter my personal feelings about them.

I don't have hope that I will get back to my weight at age 17. But, I'm still trying to lose some weight and exercise.

I don't have hope that I will become an astronaut. That was my dream as a young boy, but I will keep looking up at the stars and stand in amazement of it all.

I don't have hope that all our churches will see a grand influx of youth coming back to our churches, or all our adults engaging in bible study, or all our budget projections being perfectly met, or all of our pastors/LLMs and council leaders always agreeing with each other and never experiencing challenges and conflicts. But I have hope in the power of God to look at the "Dry Bones" of our lives and church institutions and declare to us, "You are my Beloved. I can still breathe my Spirit in you. I'm not going to abandon you even though you may have abandoned me."

I have hope not because I have a crystal ball for the future, but because I have seen and felt God and God's people come through many a storm in the past. I also read throughout the scriptures that God is a God of HOPE.

Without a sense of HOPE, we can lapse into nihilistic, chaotic, self-fulfilling doom and gloom. I don't want to live like that. I don't want to see the people and the world around me like that.

I will continue to cling to HOPE, not as a magical dream, but as my faith in a God who loves this world. And I sure HOPE that God will help me and you live out the vision of God's loving and just purposes for all. God give us HOPE!!

We Remember....











Remarkable is an overused word, but it absolutely describes the life of Catherine Stulken. She was born in the town of Fort Dauphin, Madagascar. Her parents, the Rev. David Lovaas and Emma (Hogie) Lovaas were Lutheran missionaries there until 1931, visiting the U.S. only briefly during those years. They travelled home on a steamship through the Suez Canal and the Mediterranean, then across the Atlantic Ocean. Her father was called to two small congregations in Wisconsin, and Catherine grew up in Prairie Farm. She attended 4 different high schools, graduating from Minnehaha Academy. She went on to Augsburg College and graduated with a degree as an English teacher. Later she earned her Master's Degree in literature from UW LaCrosse.

She married Donald Stulken, a fellow teacher, in 1942. They moved to Chicago so he could attend Optometric School, then opened a practice in Viroqua, Wisconsin. They moved to LaCrosse for several years, then back to live in Viroqua, while she taught English at Westby Junior High and High School. In between the teaching, professional organizations, volunteer work and further schooling she raised three children. They continued to travel widely around the US, visiting all four national borders.

She and her husband had been members of Calvary when they retired and moved to Woodruff in 1980. Kate became president of Calvary's American Lutheran Church Women group when Helen Scoval resigned in May 1982. Kate served through 1983 and 1984. She was an official delegate to the Constituting Convention of ELCA June 11-14, 1987. Kate served again after the merger as the first president of Calvary Women of the ELCA from 1988 to 1992.

After Donald's death in 1985 she moved to Waunakee, Wisconsin, to be near children and grandchildren in Madison. She continued to travel, visiting several areas of Canada, the United Kingdom, Norway, and The Netherlands. She was always interested in seeing new places and meeting people from different cultures. Late in life she made a visit back to Madagascar, to see the places where she spent her childhood.

Catherine was predeceased by her parents, her husband, and youngest son Randall (Lana). She is survived by her son Donald G. (Sally), daughter Kristi (Roch) Gersbach, and granddaughters Mariah Stulken (Reed Molls) and Larissa Stulken (special friend Skylar McLeod.) She will be missed by nieces, nephews, and many friends.

Catherine was an avid reader and lover of books and words. She was also a prolific knitter whose children and grandchildren still have many of the hats, mittens, scarves and sweaters she knit over the years. She was awarded the President's 4000 Hours award for the charity knitting she did through RSVP. She was a member of the Lutheran Church, which has become the ELCA. She was a lifelong learner who was always interested in new things. And until the last few months of her life she could beat nearly everyone at Scrabble. She ended her longest journey on Friday, July 7th. A Celebration of Life was held in Waunakee on July 19th.
